^{*}ABAWD Waivers - Food stamp law requires able-bodied adults without dependents (ABAWDs) to work three months out of every 3 years unless exempted; states can directly exempt up to 25% of their ABAWDs, and can apply for additional waivers for areas with insufficient jobs. New York State has applied for and received the additional ABAWD waivers, but has left it up to local districts that are eligible to choose whether to accept or decline the waiver for their county.
