President George W. Bush has threatened to veto an array of appropriations bills because they provide funding for domestic programs above the levels he requested in his budget. While the overall difference in funding between the House-passed appropriations bills and the president's budget request is relatively modest—less than one percent of total federal expenditures—adopting the president's budget request would mean significantly less funding in some key domestic programs that provide critical services to a broad swath of families and communities. This table includes estimates of the difference in funding for New York for some of these programs. The estimates were calculated by the Center on Budget and Policy Priorities.

For the programs examined here, not only are the president's proposed funding levels below the levels in the House-passed appropriations bills, but (with the exception of K-12 education) the president's proposed funding levels actually fall below the amounts needed just to keep pace with inflation. In fact, in the case of CDBG, the Clean Water State Revolving Fund, Justice Assistance Grants, LIHEAP, and the Home-Delivered Nutrition Services Program, the President's proposed funding levels are well below the 2007 funding levels—even without adjusting for inflation.
