This enormous tax burden continues to threaten our state's economy, discourages businesses from relocating here and contributes to minuscule gains in private sector jobs over the past decade. Clearly, bold steps have to be taken to control property taxes and reduce the tax burden for working New Yorkers. Senate Democrats have been supportive of several recent initiatives to bring about property tax relief. While these state initiatives have begun to address the problem, more action on various levels is needed.

Senate Democrats are holding a public hearing on The Future of Property Tax Relief in New York State. - Is there a way we can get school districts and localities to share resources and services to operate more efficiently and reduce costs?
- How can the state, local governments and school districts work more closely and find ways to better manage its resources?
- Proposals have been made to impose a school property tax cap, consolidate school districts or local governments, and increase opportunities to share services. Do you have additional comments on any of these approaches?
